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

Mrs. Esther Louise Luestner arrived in Decatur Tuesday for an indefinite stay with her daughter, Mrs. Doreen Reiff, wife of Jack Reiff. The Reiffs reside at 120 Limberlost Trail in the Stratton Place addition.

Mrs. Reiff's mother left Australia Monday morning of last week, and arrived in San Francisco around 5:30 o'clock that evening. By Tuesday morning, around 10 o'clock, she was talking with her daughter for the first time since 1951.

Adelaide Resident

Mrs. Luestner resides in Adelaide, South Australia, which is a city of 750 to 800 thousand population, and one of the four largest cities in the country.

Mr. Luestner is retired and he and a son, who is Mrs. Reiff's brother, and works as a customs official in Australia, did not make the trip.

Prominent Indiana School Teacher Dies

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Miss Ella C. Sengenberger, 73, one of Indiana's best known high school journalism teachers, died Saturday.

Miss Sengenberger taught at Indianapolis Tech for more than 40 years until she retired in 1959. She helped found the faculty division of the Indiana High School Press Association and took an active part in the organization since it was founded in 1922.

Delay Restoration Of Traffic Lights

Chief of police Grover Odle said this morning that the traffic lights at the intersection of Monroe and Fifth streets will not be used again until the repair work on the Pennsylvania railroad crossing is completed.

None of the four lights at the intersection is working, but stop signs have been erected to halt traffic traveling north and south on Fifth St. Once the crossing is repaired, the stop signs will be taken down and the lights restored to working order.

The light on the northeast corner was knocked down by a semi-trailer truck Friday evening, and the control box was on that pole, so the mishap knocked out all

four lights. The highway department and city police decided not to put the light back up as it would more than likely be knocked over again in a short time.
