## Our Farmers Really Help

Have you ever wondered just what good some of our local drives do? It seems like every month we have a different one, and each of us is asked to help by going door-to-door, and by giving.

We got an eye-opening report back from one which has been a favorite with Adams county rural people — the CROP drive. Hundreds of people in this county have helped annually in this drive. We have collected in the past few years in excess of \$50,000 in this county alone.

We know that this is supposed to go to help individuals overseas — people in disaster areas, or refugees displaced by governmental changes, or floods, or earthquake, or just plain lack of knowledge.

But have you wondered, as we have, how much of this gets there? If you give \$10, how much of this gets overseas?

Now for the surprise. The \$10 which you gave (or might give this year) actually distributed \$238.90 worth of food overseas, through Christian sources, to the needy!

How can \$10 buy so much? CROP didn't have to pay for the food, or its actual transportation overseas. CROP got as much U. S. government surplus food as possible, and used parts of your funds to store and distribute the food overseas.

Yes, figures show that of Indiana's \$203,667.77 collected for CROP \$40,455 was used by Church World Service in the surplus food project. One fifth of the amount used for surplus food in the entire country was furnished by Hoosier farmers!

This \$40,455 supplied 18,932,940 pounds of surplus foods — and took this out of expensive government storage and decreased the surplus by that amount. This would have cost \$966,874 if purchased on the market.

Well, what happened then to the rest of the \$203,664.77, the part not used in the surplus food program? Part went to buy foods that are not in surplus, and to distribute them.

But most went into the new self-help programs. Instead of just sending food, and more food, year after year, CROP and CWS, and other similar church agencies, are now sending technicians, and tools, to help the people become self-sufficient.

And the food, instead of just being handed out, week after week, is being used to "pay" local people for constructing needed public works — roads to take their crops to market, waterways, sewers, etc.

So the use of American surplus is being wisely channeled to help other people to help themselves. And who's doing it? Well, in Adams county, the second county in the state in CROP, it is the farmers themselves who are doing the lion's share of the work!

## The People's Voice

This column is for the use of our readers who wish to make suggestions for the general good or discuss questions of interest. No articles will be published without signature of the author.

"Children should be taught to read the Bible and pray at home, and not in the public schools." This is the conviction presented by those who strongly favor the Supreme court's recent decision, regarding prayer and Bible reading within the public schools.

I agree, required Bible reading and required prayer should not be part of a public school's curriculum. If some desire to promote this effort, then let more parochial, or church schools be established. In recent years the Southern Baptist and the Seventh Day Adventist have established church schools.

My conviction, however, is, that if an instructor desires to offer a self-worded prayer or read passages from the Bible, they should not be prohibited from doing so.

Christian parents who desire that their children make a study of the Bible and practice prayer have a very sober responsibility today! This responsibility, schools can no longer help them legally to meet. Have the homes the right to ask the public schools to do for our children what we, as parents, have failed to do ourselves?

History reveals that this country was largely founded by God-fearing men and women who sought religious liberty, and state control freedom. The Bible, being the only book they possessed in most cases, became the center of their home culture. Today we see a de-emphasis of daily Bible reading within the home, even by professing Christians. The results of this neglect are beginning to show within our homes, churches and schools. The result is, that the factory, office, farm and laboratory often fail to recognize God's control and presence.

Just recently a Bible quiz was given to 11th and 12th grade pupils in a senior high school. (This school was in Massachusetts.) Some thought that Sodom and Gomorrah were lovers, that the Gospels were written by Matthew, Mark, Luther and John, that Eve was created from an apple, and that the parables which Jesus used were parodies. (non-sense-funny). Eighty to ninety per cent of all these students could not complete such familiar quotations as: "Many are called, but few are chosen." A soft answer turneth away wrath and "The love of money is the root of all evil."

Now, this would be humorous, if it was not tragic. Parents, it would seem, we must do a better job within our homes than we are now doing! These quotes that our youth fail to finish cannot altogether be blamed on them. They are on the spot when confronted with them and cannot answer them. This Bible is life's textbook, life's blueprint. If our own flesh and blood are to know very much about it and depend upon its teachings in their formative years, we, as parents, will have to lead the way. I hope this result of the Bible quiz promoted in Massachusetts is not typical in all of our senior high schools. I am afraid it is.

It seems to me the greatest need today is not more bombs, guns, armies, and scientists, but more God-fearing Christian homes. More profession of knowing Christ of the Cross is not enough. We must put into daily practice as best we can the teachings that the greatest of Teachers
