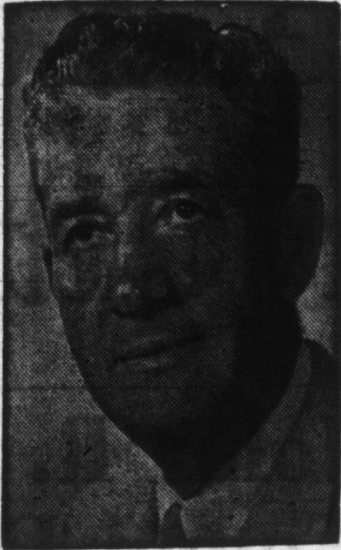

TRADE IN DECATUR

Charge Military Attaches Drugged

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet authorities maintained silence today on American and British charges that four Western military attaches were drugged recently in the Russian city of Odessa.

The U.S. attaches involved in the March 25 incident were identified as Marine Lt. Col. James Landrigan, Navy Cmdr. Sumner Shapiro and Air Force Lt. Col. William Van Meter. The British officer was assistant naval attaché Lt. Cmdr. J. Harvey Samuel.

The U.S. and British embassies lodged official protests with the Soviet government last Saturday, noting the apparent drugging with barbiturates during an official visit by the attaches to the Black Sea port.

The U.S. embassy said Thursday night medical tests showed barbiturates were present in the blood streams of the attaches in sufficient amounts to cause extreme drowsiness. The embassy said the protest had been delayed more than a month while the tests were being

analyzed.

The three attaches first became aware that they had been drugged when they awoke on the morning of March 26 feeling extremely drowsy, a U. S. Embassy spokesman said. They had dined together at the hotel the evening before but it was not known whether the drugging occurred during the meal.

The U.S. spokesman declined to state whether there was any apparent motive for the drugging. He said there was no indication the hotel room or the officers were searched while they were asleep. They returned to Moscow following the incident.

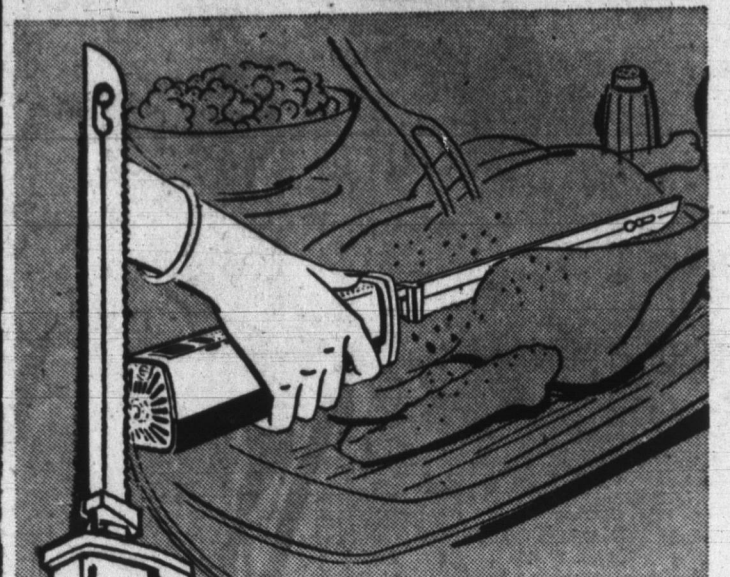

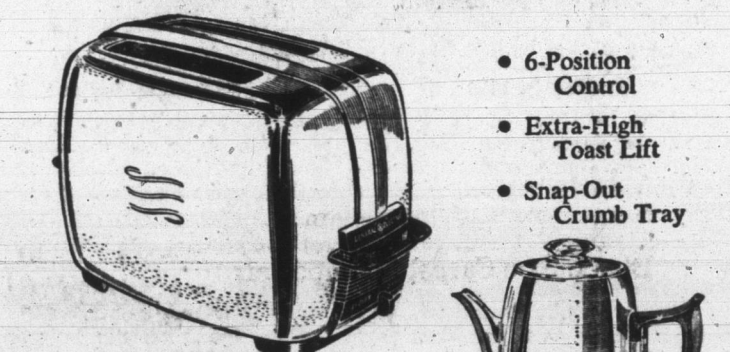
