CHICAGO (UPI) — Some of gangland's most celebrated characters jammed a suburban roadhouse Wednesday night for a sumptuous wedding feast in honor of the newlywed son of reputed underworld czar emeritus Anthony J. (Big Tuna) Accardo.

Scores of hoodlums joined about 1,000 other guests in bearing cold-cash gifts of up to \$1,000 to Anthony R. Accardo, 29, and his beauty queen bride, the former Janet Marie Hawley, 22, daughter of a Green River, Wyo., rancher.

Undercover agents from the Chicago police department and Federal Bureau of Investigation lurked around the canal-infested Villa Venice restaurant in suburban Northbrook to catch a glimpse of the celebrants.

On hand for the affair were Felix (Milwaukee Phil) Alderisio, Murray (The Camel) Humphreys, Jimmy (The Monk) Allegretti, Paul (The Waiter) Ricca, Joey (Caesar) Di Varco and dozens of other underworld characters.

**Serve As Guards**

Tony (Pineapples) Eldorado served as a watchman while ex-bank robber Jimmy Porello kept an eye on the car-hikers who parked the glistening limousines of the guests.

There was some wild driving as hoodlums wheeled their powerful cars into the parking lot and shielded their faces from police cameras at the same time.


Accardo, the greying father of the groom and chauffeur for the late gangland kingpin Al (Scarface) Capone during Prohibition, headed for his swank bullet-proof home with his wife shortly after the bride and groom departed.

The platinum blonde bride was a runnerup in the 1960 Miss Universe contest. Young Accardo is a partner in a subversive agency in nearby Oak Park.

Guests at the wedding ceremony included Ricca, Sam (Teets) Battaglia and Jackie (The Lackey) Cerone, who chewed and popped gum through the Service at St. Vincent Ferror Roman Catholic Church.

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**Little Zest By  
GOP Governors  
For Campaign**

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Most Republican governors, demoralized by political developments at the annual Governors' Conference, had little zest today for the 1964 election campaign.

Unlike the prospective majority of delegates to the GOP National Convention next month, only a minority of the 16 Republican governors want Sen. Barry Goldwater nominated for the presidency.

They knew even before they heard from former Vice President Richard M. Nixon that the conference this week offered the last chance to organize formidable competition for the Arizona senator.

Twelve years ago at their Houston meeting, the astute Thomas E. Dewey of New York lined up most Republican governors in a tactical move which led to the defeat of Sen. Robert A. Taft's bid for presidential nomination.

There was no Dewey on the scene this year and no candidate with the stature of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, who won the nomination from Taft at the 1952 convention.

In 1964, four years after his two terms in the White House, Eisenhower seemed to be marching up the hill twice within a month against Goldwater only to march down again.

When Eisenhower came here for a meeting with the Republican governors, he convinced them that he had accepted a Goldwater nomination as inevitable.

The Goldwater opposition includes governors both in the small states and the populous industrial states. But those from the industrial states were the ones most worried. They contended that Goldwater at the top of the ticket would be a drag on candidates for congressional and state offices.

Eisenhower threw Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton's hat in the ring and then pulled it out himself. Then Nixon tossed in the hat of Michigan Gov. George Romney, but Romney pulled it out.

**Summer School On  
At Adams Central**

The annual summer school program was started in the Adams Central school June 1. For the first time this year a program of remedial reading is being offered in grades 2-9.
