Sheriff's Office Is Back In Courthouse

The Adams county sheriff's office has returned to its previous location in the county courthouse.

The office was moved to the jail several months ago when construction began on the courthouse elevator. Today, the office was returned to its location on the second floor of the courthouse.

Third State Police Trooper In County

Floyd (Fuzzy) Ehlerding, a native of this county, began his duties as an Adams county trooper Saturday.

Attempt To Force Buggy Off Highway

Dan Hilly, of route 1, Monroe, reported to the sheriff's department last night that an automobile attempted to force his horse and buggy off the road.

Hilly said he was westbound in Monroe at 11:05 p.m. Monday night, in front of the Monroe Elevator, when an auto behind his buggy attempted to force him off the road. The car bumped the buggy and broke its shaft, causing an estimated \$30 damage. The incident is still under investigation by the sheriff's department.

Amendments to the law in recent years have lowered the eligibility requirements.

2. Q—I thought that only women could start their social security benefits at age 62. Is this correct?

A—No. Since the 1961 amendments to the social security act, men as well as women can begin receiving benefits at age 62. However, the amount of your monthly benefit is permanently reduced if you take payments before age 65—to take account of the longer period over which you will be collecting them.

3. Q—I was born April 1, 1901, and never worked under social security until last year, when my husband died and I went to work. How many credits would I need to be eligible for benefits?

A—A woman born in 1901 would need to work in a job covered by social security for at least 12 quarters (three years). Prior to 1960, you would have needed 24 quarters, or twice as much as the present law requires.

4. Q—By how much will my monthly benefit be reduced if I start receiving social security checks before age 65?

A—Social security retirement benefits are reduced by 20 percent if begun at age 62, by 13½ percent if begun at age 63, or only 6½ percent if begun at age 64.

5. Q—Suppose I do apply for benefits at age 65, and have my benefit amount set at a certain level, but keep on earning high wages. When I finally retire completely, will I have to settle for the amount that was set up at age 65?

A—No. Your benefit amount may be refigured to include earnings after age 65, and if these earnings are high enough, it may be increased.

6. Q—I am past 72 years of age, and am still earning over \$4800 a year. I have not yet received social security benefit checks. Why not?

A—Probably because you have never filed an application for benefits. Benefits may be paid for each month, starting with the month you attain age 72, regardless of your earnings. However, you can get this only if you file a claim with your social security office.

New York — Ray Castelloux of Buffalo, N.Y., won the 112½ mile race, final event of the U.S. Olympic cycling trials.

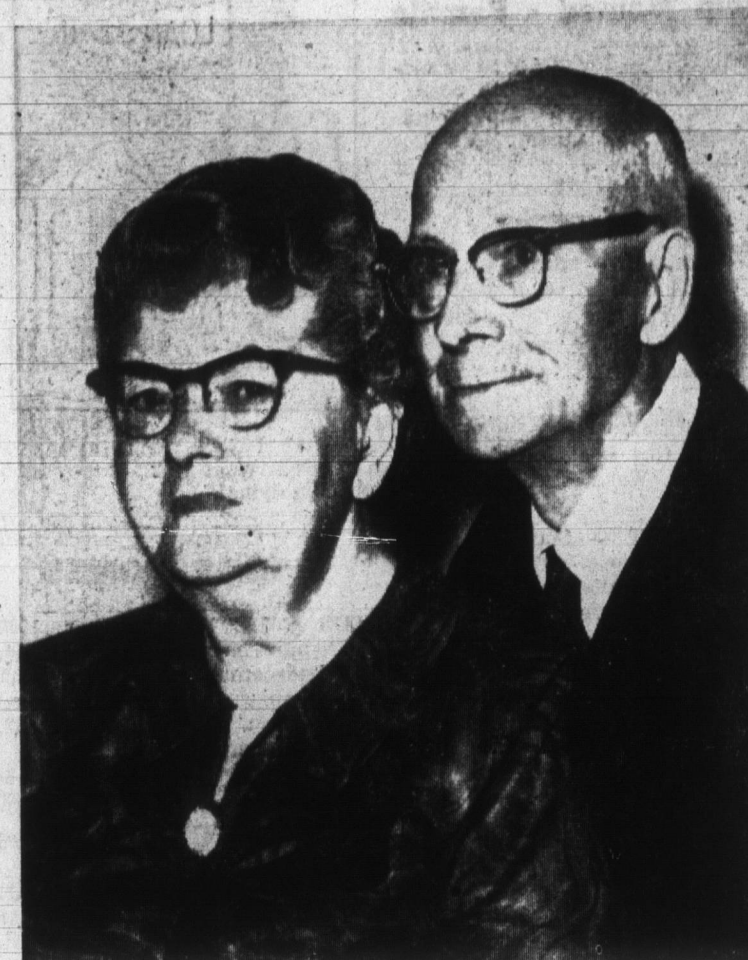
Dallas, Tex. — Charles Coody won the Dallas Open golf tournament by one stroke with a 72-hole score of 271, nine under par.
