**Food-For-Peace Is
Extended Two Years**

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—President Johnson extended the food-for-peace program for another two years Thursday but said he was disturbed by provisions to control program finances.

The government permits sale of government-owned surplus farm products for foreign currencies.

Johnson, in a statement issued while campaigning here, said he was "very happy" to sign a bill that extends the program as a vital part of U.S. foreign policy. However, "two provisions are particularly undesirable," he said.

"One seeks to give either the House Committee on Agriculture or the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry a veto power over certain proposed dispositions of foreign currencies accruing from sales," Johnson said.

"The other seeks to prevent the President from making certain loans at interest rates below a specified level unless he has the concurrence of an advisory committee..." Johnson said.

"Both such provisions represent a clear violation of the constitutional principle of separation of powers," the President said.

"However, I appreciate the desire of the Congress to be informed and to be consulted on the operations of all aspects of the program and I am directing that executive appointees see that this is done."

**Defends Johnson
Security Risks**

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—Sen. Vance Hartke today vigorously defended President Johnson's security risks at public gatherings.

Hartke admitted "there was a certain amount of risk and danger" when Johnson ignored the advice of his own Secret Service agents and police in mingling with the crowds in Indianapolis Thursday.

But the senator maintained that a speaker would be more vulnerable while speaking from a podium than while handshaking hundreds of persons in an impromptu manner.

"You can't separate the government from the people," Hartke declared. "The people want to see and be close to the President. They want to shake hands with him. It is a part of democracy. You can't put the President in a little cell."

Hartke said Johnson's Indiana reception "exceeded my fondest hopes."

He listed prosperity, and year that Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, GOP president nominee, might

drop the atomic bomb hastily and that he might tamper with social security as leading assets of President Johnson's Hoover campaign.

Another Whistle Stop

Hartke announced he will stage a whistle-stop train campaign Oct. 28, beginning at New Albany and ending at Hammond. There will be 18 stops in 14 counties.

The senator will speak briefly at New Albany, Salem, Orleans, Mitchell, Bedford, Bloomington, Cloverdale, Greencastle, Roachdale, Crawfordsville, Linden, Lafayette, Chalmers, Monon, Rensselaer, Lowell, Dyer, and Hammond.

Mrs. Hartke already has spoken in all 92 counties and today accompanied her husband on visits to Indianapolis homes.

On Saturday, Hartke will stage an extensive tour of Lake County, and on Sunday will undertake a boat trip on the Ohio River from Utica to Jeffersonville to inspect lock and dam works on that stream which he said carries more traffic than the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Also on Sunday, the senior senator and his wife will shift to a helicopter and visit Scottsburg, Bedford, Logooote, Petersburg, Huntington and Rockport.

Hartke on Monday will return to Washington to receive the 10th anniversary commemorative medal of the Assembly of Captive European Nations.
