Mrs. Johnson had left on a political tour, by Mrs. Dean Rusk, and all of the other cabinet members' wives except Mrs. McNamara and Mrs. Katzenbach, and Mrs. George Reed, wife of the press secretary, were present to greet the ladies.

## To White House

Mrs. Johnson left word that she was deeply sorry she couldn't be there in person, but since the entire first family was gone, she authorized the staff to take the group through the closed areas, upstairs and down, that were the private residence rooms of the president. The women saw President Lincoln's bath tub — it had a full-length mirror over it, and the ladies could just see raw-boned old Abe, with his knees and shins sticking out, in that mirror! The two-hour reception was the highlight, and the UPI reception and banquet that followed, until 10:30 p.m. with no long speeches, was almost an anti-climax.

We joined a group that went over to the National Press Club, and spent a few hours there, before returning to the UPI's hospitality party to say goodbye, for a year at least, to our newly met friends. Many flew back, others drove, but all had thoroughly enjoyed the meeting, as well as developed new and stronger ideas on many of the problems facing newspapers of all sizes today.

Sells Charges  
GOP Fosters  
Race Hatreds

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Republicans were accused of mailing out untrue propaganda designed to foster racial hatred by Dallas Sells, president of the Indiana AFL-CIO, at a news conference today.

Sells said that union members were receiving letters warning that they may lose their jobs to Negroes and that their property values may decrease if they have Negro neighbors, in the event of the election of President Johnson.

He said the letters, sent chiefly to union members in Marion and Lake Counties, so-called "white backlash" strongholds, also charged that labor leaders have made a "sweetheart contract" with President Johnson. The letters were signed "An Average Union Man."

Sells pointed out that circulation of unsigned campaign material is a violation of the law, adding that he will seek prosecution, if he can prove the source of the missives.

Most of the letters were postmarked Franklin, he added.

Says Johnson Strong

Sells said President Johnson stronger among unionists than any other presidential bidder in history and predicted that the vote of Republicans switching to the President will

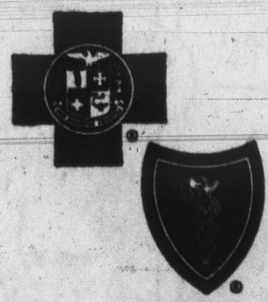
