GOP Payoff Is Charged By Speed Typist

WASHINGTON (UPI) — GOP National Chairman Dean Burch has dismissed as "nonsensical" the charge that a Democratic party employee was paid \$1,000 to deliver confidential information to the Republicans.

Louis Flax, 39, a speed typist and Teletype operator at the Democratic National Committee, charged in a sworn affidavit that he got \$1,000 for giving information to John A. Grenier, executive director of the Republican National Committee. The affidavit was released Tuesday by Democratic National Chairman John M. Bailey, who termed the alleged incident "deeply shocking and disturbing."

Grenier was not immediately available for comment, but Burch issued a statement attacking the Democrats on the Bobby Baker and Billie Sol Estes cases in which he said:

Diverts Attention
"To divert attention from these serious events, John Bailey comes up with a nonsensical story resembling the escapade of putting a Democratic spy on the Goldwater train."

Burch was referring to the incident about two weeks ago when Moira O'Connor, a Democratic worker, slipped aboard Sen. Barry M. Goldwater's campaign train and passed out Democratic literature before she was put off in West Virginia.

Flax said he had personally delivered copies of Western Union messages to Grenier on Oct. 2, with the knowledge of his superiors at Democratic headquarters.

Shortly after their meeting, he said, an unidentified man in Grenier's office met him outside Republican headquarters and handed him \$1,000 in cash.

Given Go-Ahead
Flax said he notified Wayne Phillips, assistant Democratic publicity director, of the deal the night before he saw Grenier. He said Phillips told him to go ahead, and supplied him with Western Union message copies which had been screened.

Phillips said the Democrats had mailed Grenier screened copies of their messages each day since Flax made his first

Hunting, Fishing Fee Boost Proposed

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—State Conservation Director Donald E. Foltz today gave top priority to a proposed bill for the 1965 Legislature to double the fee for Indiana hunting and fishing licenses.

Foltz picked that and two others among 28 proposed bills for priority. He said Indiana licenses are the lowest in the nation.

The bill calls for the present hunting and fishing license charge of \$2.50 to be doubled and single hunting or fishing licenses to be \$3 each. A differential in favor of women fishermen would be eliminated. They now can buy a fishing license for \$1.50.

Foltz reported Tuesday to the Indiana Conservation Commission that the average for the 50 states is \$3.63 for a hunting license and \$3.06 for a fishing license.

Other bills Foltz said he was willing to "bleed and die for" or at least get red in the neck about included one allowing conservation officers to retire at 55 and be covered by workers' compensation and other benefits similar to those provided for state police.

Another would allow the director instead of the legislature to set the seasons for various types of game.

The commission renewed for five years a U.S. Steel Co. permit at Gary allowing it to fill in a portion of Lake Michigan. It also authorized the department to enter into agreements with the Lake Tippecanoe Protective Association, the Clear Lake Town Board, and the Barbee Lake Cottagers Association to pay half the cost of lake control dams.

Foltz said a dam will be constructed in Marshall County costing about \$74,000 to replace one in disrepair on a chain of lakes involving the Tippecanoe River.

Also approved was an application from the Michigan City Port Authority to construct piers in the Washington Park basin of Lake Michigan.
