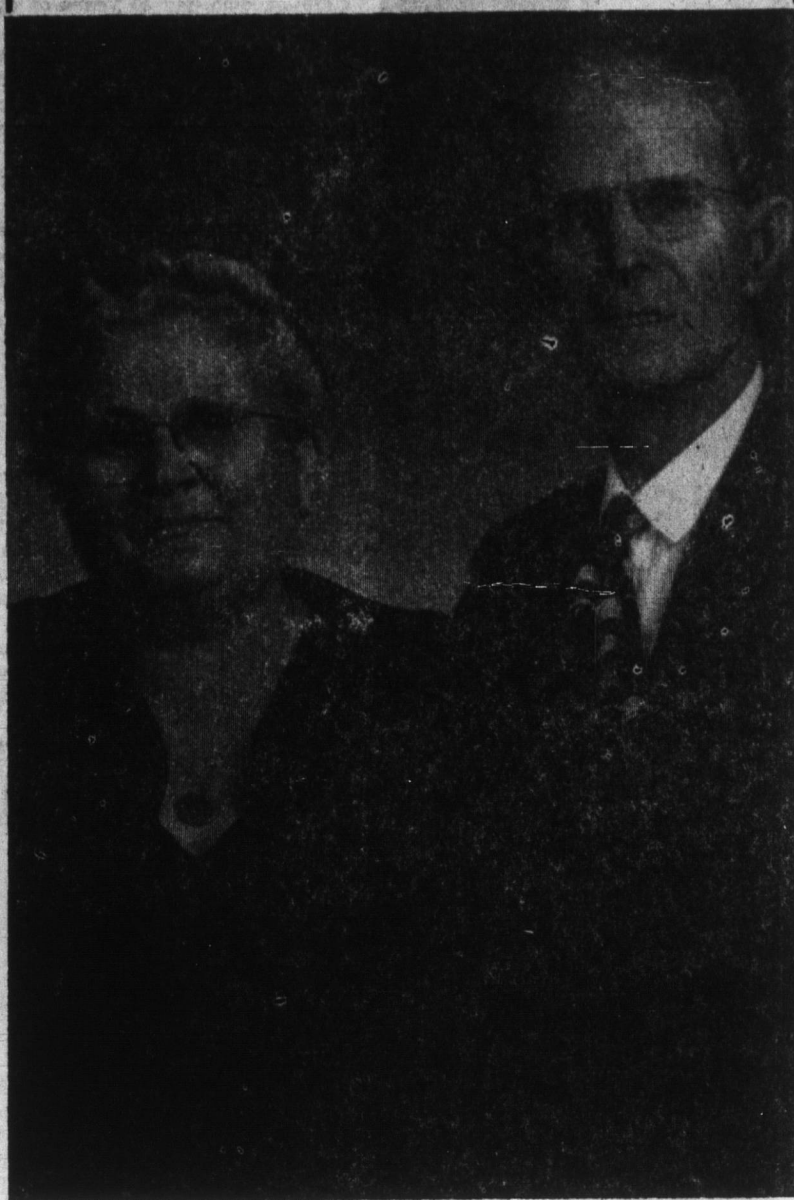

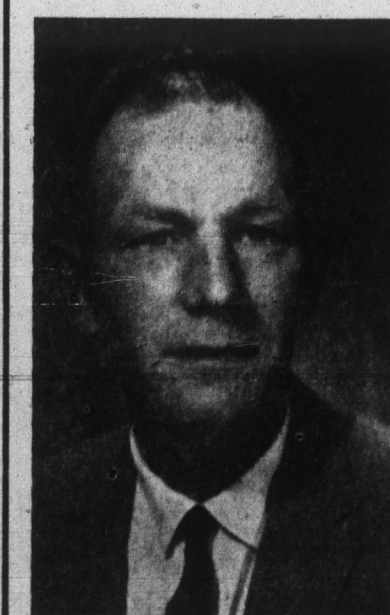
For her wedding trip to the southern states, the bride will wear a black and white wool two piece suit, with matching black accessories. She will wear the orchid from the bridal bouquet.
