Pete Reynolds, managing editor, oversees the assembly of each day's paper and selects wire service and local stories. He has been with the paper 32 yrs.

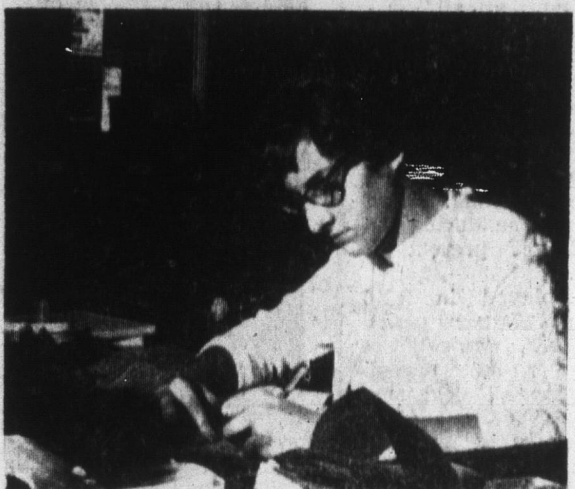


Bob Shraluka, sports editor, assembles each day's sports page, and covers the police station and courts. He has been with the paper for five years.

It's an announcement of a meeting, a bulletin for a church, a review of a high school class play.

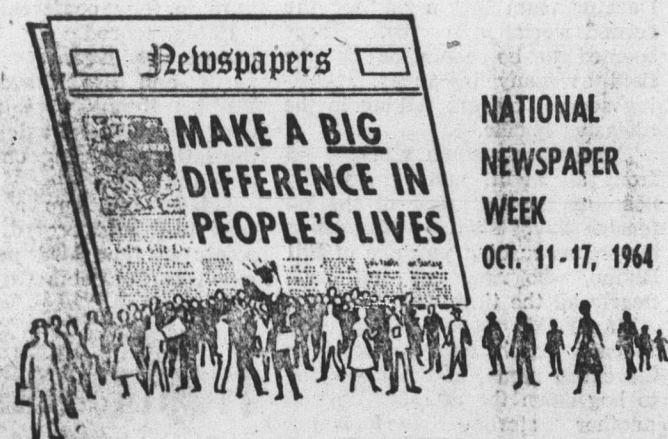
It's information about you, your neighbor, the lady down the street or the family who lived here five years ago.
