Voting Procedure Explained So Your Ballot Will Count

A few years ago right here in Decatur a recount of ballots indicated that a number of people did not correctly and legally mark their ballots. The following article is printed as a public service by the Decatur Daily Democrat to assure that every voter will know the correct way to vote.

Upon entering the election room, the voter should announce his or her name and sign his or her name and address on the voter's poll list at the poll clerk's table.

The voter then receives his three ballots and a blue pencil from the poll clerk, and must not accept the ballot unless the initials of the poll clerks are on the lower left hand corner of the back of each ballot in ink.

No ballot shall be accepted outside the election room.

Straight Ticket

If you desire to vote for all the candidates of one party on either the national, state, or county ballot, he may mark a cross, or X, inside the large circle at the head of the party for whose candidates he desires to vote. NO OTHER MARK SHOULD BE MADE ON THE BALLOT.

(Some people mark an x in the circle, and then an x by each name — this is illegal, and mutilates the ballot. You lose your vote.)

Split Ticket

If you do not want to vote a

straight ticket, DO NOT mark an x in any circle containing the party emblems. Instead, place an X inside the small squares to the left of the name of each of the candidates you favor.

DO NOT mark more names than there are positions to fill. For example, notice on the state ballot that appellate court judges

DO NOT run against each other. From the first district, which is the south half of the state, three will be elected. But you may vote for any three, if you so desire — even three straight across from one another.

For appellate court, 2nd district, judges living in the north-half of the state, there are two candidates to be elected, and you may vote for any two.

In all other races, however, vote only for one man on each horizontal line.

After Marking Ballot

After you have marked your ballot, and before leaving the voting booth, the voter must fold each ballot so that the face of the ballot cannot be seen, and so that the initials of the poll clerk on the back of the ballot, can be seen, and so that each ballot will pass through the ballot box opening.

Then you may leave the voting booth and hand your ballots to the inspector, who deposits them in the proper ballot boxes in the voter's presence; hand the blue pencil to the poll clerk and immediately leave the election room.

The voter should not remain in the booth longer than may be necessary to prepare his ballot, and in any event not longer than three minutes.

Other Information

If you accidentally or by mistake deface, mutilate, or spoil your ballot, do not hesitate to return it immediately to the poll clerks, and get another ballot.

If the voter displays his ballot to anyone to show anyone how he or she has voted, it must not be placed in the ballot box, and the voter must immediately leave the election room.

The voter should not remain in the booth longer than may be necessary to prepare his ballot, and in any event not longer than three minutes.


