There are now 112 inmates in the soldiers' home at Lafayette.

Rush county commissioners have awarded the contract for the building of a new courthouse to cost \$157,143.

Otto Karschbaum of Poppleton, Ripley county, aged 45, while falling trees was struck on the head and instantly killed.

Mrs. Ella Ford, a widow of Moral township, Shelby county, has brought suit for \$3,000 damages for breach of promise, the defendant being William C. Dailey.

Drillers for oil near Van Buren have struck a "gusher," which yielded 1,200 barrels before it could be controlled. The town has taken on a great boom in consequence.

Hyd-on Harness, who has been mourned for by his parents at Jeffersonville for 27 years, suddenly turned up and says he is living at Danville, Ill. He has become quite wealthy since his departure from his old home.

The fifth annual meeting of the Saving and Loan Association of Indiana met in Indianapolis yesterday with about 45 members present, representing associations of Indianapolis, Bloomington, Warsaw, Crawfordsville, Newcastle, New Albany, Shelbyville, Terre Haute, Wabash, Anderson, Michigan City, Richmond, Connersville and other places.

## ROOKER BOND FIXED

Judge McCray Put the Amount at \$5,000 to Hold Him.

### EXHIBITION OF OLD TIME RELICS.

Interesting Collection of Ancient Articles With Histories—Missing Girl Located in Missouri—Family's Narrow Escape From Cremation—Minister Alarmingly Ill. Notes of the State.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 10.—Judge McCray yesterday afternoon fixed the bond of Alonzo Rooker in the case against him for assault on Mrs. Emma Pees at \$5,000. He said that he put the amount high so that Rooker would not go free, although a number of Rooker's friends were here from Morgan county for the purpose of furnishing bail. County Attorney Wiltzie is endeavoring to have the case set for trial next week.

Rooker was brought into the criminal court yesterday afternoon and arraigned on the charge of assault and battery with intent to kill Mrs. Pees. He pleaded not guilty.

The state's attorneys are making an effort to have Rooker's friends pay his attorney's fees instead of having them levied upon the county.

### INTERESTING COLLECTION.

Old Time Relics on Exhibition at a Social Given in Corydon.

CORYDON, Ind., March 10.—An "old relic" social was held at the residence of Dr. A. L. Rely at this place, and a few of the articles exhibited included a cane carried by George Washington, now the property of Hoz Luckett; a fancy snuffbox 116 years old, and a candle belonging to G. W. Applegate, which was burned at the illumination over the election of William Henry Harrison in 1840, and the election of each succeeding Republican president, and at each wedding of the family, beginning with his mother. The candle was originally three feet long, but is now only six inches in length. A Bible 120 years old, owned by Mrs. S. M. Stockinger; a book over 200 years old; a spinningwheel over 100 years old; a pair of high heel and high topped boots worn by Wilkes Booth; a highcap 125 years old, and a battered 150 years old were also exhibited.

### Revolver and Iron Weights Figned.

ELKHART, Ind., March 10.—John Wiggins and George Ratner got into a dispute over a debt that the former owed the latter, at Goshen. During the altercation Wiggins hurled several iron weights, at Ratner, who drew a revolver and fired five shots at Wiggins, who managed to escape by dodging under a counter. One of the bullets struck Hal W. Toms, a bystander, in the abdomen, and he may not recover. Ratner has been arrested. The affair occurred in the United States Express company's office.

### Missing Girl Located.

BRAZIL, Ind., March 10.—Mary Stough, the pretty 17-year-old daughter of George Stough, who mysteriously disappeared from her home near Asher-ville, this county, last Wednesday, has been located at Clinton, Mo. The authorities have her under arrest, and her father left for that place yesterday to bring her home.

### Sons Acted as Pallbearers.

MOORESVILLE, Ind., March 10.—The burial of the remains of Mrs. John Sellers occurred yesterday, and an unusual and affecting scene was her six stalwart sons acting as pallbearers. Among the sons is A. H. Sellers, city passenger agent of the Lake Erie and Western Railway company at Indianapolis.

### Narrowly Escaped Cremation.

VALPARAISO, Ind., March 10.—The residence of John Parake of Jackson Center was totally destroyed by fire yesterday. The family had a narrow escape, being awakened by the baby, a falling beam dropping from the second floor on the cradle. Loss, \$3,500.

### Saloonkeeper Sent to Jail.

WINCHESTER, Ind., March 10.—Taylor Burton of this city was fined \$50 and sentenced to jail for 30 days by Judge Marsh yesterday for giving whisky to an inebriate. He was also disfranchised for one year.

### Rev. Chaffee Alarmingly Ill.

LAFORTE, Ind., March 10.—Rev. T. C. Chaffee, one of the best known ministers in Indiana, is alarmingly ill at his home in this city.

### INDIANA HAPPENINGS.

Harry Tuttle of Elkhart is dead of paralysis of the brain, aged 74.

Mrs. Mandin and child of Rushville were seriously burned by the explosion of coal oil.

Mrs. Hannah J. Bryan, one of the oldest pioneers of Hendricks county, is dead at the age of 80.

Samuel Eades of Noblesville, aged 26, attempted suicide by shooting, but the bullet glanced off his head and he was not badly hurt.

Mrs. William Clark of Shelby county fell some weeks ago, breaking her right leg. Saturday, while badly unable to hobble around, she fell and broke the left leg.

Charles Miller, a farmer, was struck by a Lake Erie and Western passenger train at Laporte yesterday and was instantly killed. He was driving across the track when struck.

Mrs. Charles Black, who is a member of the HARRY CLARK Variety company, showing at Indianapolis, has received word that by the death of her mother at Detroit, she has inherited \$25,000.

Milton Dolan, 11 years old, son of Professor J. T. Dolan of Greencastle, was accidentally killed by a playmate, while the boys were engaged in a sugar camp, carrying shotguns, to be benighted.

Frank Plick, near Shelbyville, was assaulted and robbed by two men, who beat him until he was unconscious, and then laid his body across a railroad track. Plick recovered consciousness barely in time to escape death.

## RIOTING IN BALBOA

Twelve Thousand Spaniards Take Part In the Demonstrations.

### DENOUNCE THE UNITED STATES.

There were almost powerless as the Mob Marched Through the Streets Shouting "Long Live Spain" and "Down With the Yankees!"—More Quiet Elsewhere In Spain.

BALBOA, Spain, March 10.—There was another anti-American riot here yesterday afternoon and it was of greater importance than the previous so-called riotous disturbances caused by the action of congress of the United States in regard to Cuba. Twelve thousand took part in the popular demonstration. The excitement was started by a group of young men at a street corner, who began cheering every soldier who passed by. Their conduct was soon imitated by other groups of people, until every soldier seen was cheered by the crowds, and some musicians, who refused to repeat the national anthem, were hustled, beaten and otherwise maltreated.

### "Down With the Yankees."

The excitement increased, and riotous groups formed in the main streets, cheering for Spain and denouncing the United States. The authorities did everything possible to maintain order. Almost the entire police force was turned out as soon as the populace assumed a threatening aspect, and the rioters were dispersed again and again. Eventually, however, the mob became so numerous and excited that the police were almost helpless. After the first demonstration of sympathy with the army, the crowds had armed themselves with sticks and cudgels, and their numbers were so great that the police were swept aside and an immense crowd gathered on the leading thoroughfares and marched toward the residence of the United States consul shouting, "Long Live Spain!" "Down with the Yankees!"

### Weyler Severely Denounced.

PENSACOLA, Fla., March 10.—An immense meeting was held here last night to express sympathy with Cuba and endorse the action of congress in granting belligerent rights. Many ladies were in the audience and stirring speeches were made in favor of the independence of Cuba. General Weyler was severely denounced and a large collection was taken for the benefit of the Cuban club.

### Monmouth College Musical Club.

MONMOUTH, Ill., March 10.—The first musical organization of any consequence that has ever represented Monmouth college abroad leaves during the present month for a week's tour of Iowa. The organization consists of banjo, mandolin, guitar and glee-club, and they are at present in the hands of the best of instructors preparing for their first appearance away from home. The combined clubs embrace some splendid musical talent and will compare favorably with similar organizations.

### Inquest Postponed.

NEW YORK, March 10.—The inquest in the case of the two children of George R. Kelsey, who were killed by their mother while she was insane, has been indefinitely postponed. It was to have been begun yesterday before Deputy Coroner Fitzpatrick, but that official is ill, and the case was accordingly adjourned by Coroner Hoobler.

### Boy Trainwreckers Arraigned.

ROME, N. Y., March 10.—The cases of J. Watson Hildreth, Theodore Gibbard and Herbert Plato, the boy trainwreckers, came up in the supreme court yesterday. The boys' counsel entered a plea of not guilty in each case. The trial of the cases has been set down for April 20.

### Protect the Consulate at Any Cost.

The police, who made a number of arrests, experienced considerable difficulty in escorting their prisoners to the depots. During the whole afternoon there was more or less disorder. It was decided to keep both the police proper and the gendarmes confined to barracks until further orders, as there seemed to be danger of another outbreak. The United States consulate is now guarded by a strong detachment of gendarmes armed with carbines, revolvers and swords, and they have instructions to protect the consulate at any cost.

### FROM THE CAPITAL.

Elsewhere in Spain the Situation Bears a More Tranquil Aspect.

MADRID, March 10.—The turbulent element in the city of Balboa which created disturbances yesterday continued to defy the authorities and made violent demonstrations in spite of the armed threat of the gendarmes.

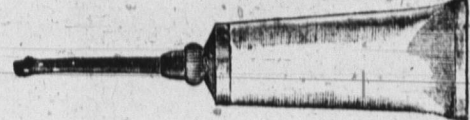
The disorders were renewed near the American consulate, and a determined effort was made to reach the building where the consulate is located. The gendarmes showed equal determination in frustrating this attempt and succeeded. But this was not done without a serious collision between the mob and the gendarmes, in which 20 of the former are known to have been injured, though it is not stated that any fatalities resulted. Nine of the gendarmes were also injured. With this rebuff the mob drew off. But the inhabitants of Balboa are still in a turbulent mood and the police authorities find it necessary to take every precaution to guard against injury being done to the United States consulate.

Elsewhere in Spain the situation bears a more tranquil aspect and the action of the United States on Cuba is regarded in a calmer mood.

A report found currency yesterday that the United States minister, Mr. Taylor, has left Madrid, but this proved to be wholly without foundation.

A dispatch from Havana says that the insurgents are in a demoralized condition and are seeking flight toward the eastward portion of the island.

## LOCATE THE ELOPERS

Romance In Real Life Revealed In Ripley County.

### APPEARANCE OF GRASSHOPPERS.

Most Terrible Retribution of a Man Who Attempted Suicide—Now Totally Blind and a Maniac—Opposition to Congressman Royce—Fears For Consul Fay's Safety—News Notes.

OSGOOD, March 7.—James Goodwin, a farmer of this neighborhood, was arrested on a telegram from the sheriff of Cheyenne county, Kan., charging him with embezzlement and with eloping with another man's wife, and that his alleged wife was a Mrs. John Muir, and Miss Myrtle, the 16-year-old girl, was her daughter. Goodwin denied the charge, but the frightened woman gave the whole story away. Her father, Thomas Norton, a wealthy ranchman in Kansas, broke off her engagement to Goodwin, a cowboy, and made her marry Muir. Goodwin went west married, struck it rich in the mines, and came back. They both repudiated a divorce, but were refused. Then they eloped with her and her daughter, coming here about a year ago, where they have resided ever since as man and wife, although it is claimed they were never married.

### TERIBLE RETRIBUTION.

Man Who Attempted Suicide—Now a Maniac and Is Totally Blind.

AVILLA, Ind., March 7.—Terrible retribution has followed the crime of Gideon Houser, who committed a robbery near here; and, when pursued, sent a bullet crashing through his head. Houser hovered between life and death in the Albion jail for a number of days, the pleading of his young wife saving him from the penitentiary. He was taken to Kansas City, Mo., and a telegram from that city says he has become a raving maniac, in addition to being stricken totally blind, the latter affliction resulting from his wound. Houser was a member of a prominent family.

### Fears For Consul Fay's Safety.

GREENCASTLE, Ind., March 7.—There is a great uneasiness here over the news from Valencia, Spain. Mr. A. F. Fay is consul there, and his wife was formerly Miss Susie G. Kelly of this city. Mr. Fay was sent to Denia, Spain, but makes Valencia his headquarters, that being a larger city, and it was his official residence that was stoned. Mr. and Mrs. Fay have lately gone to Spain, and the lady's father fears that news from there is withheld on account of the Spanish officials inspecting all messages.

### Saloon Property Wrecked.

WARREN, Ind., March 7.—A riot has taken place in Isaac Lang's government saloon and billiard hall, resulting in demolishing the furniture, breaking the doors and windows and inaugurating a scene of terror for about three hours. It was after closing hours and fireable entrance was made by battering down the doors. The town has been in a fever of excitement for several weeks, occasioned by the difference of opinion between Prohibitionists and anti-Prohibitionists.

### Opposition to Congressman Royce.

GOSHEN, Ind., March 7.—A bitter fight for the Republican nomination of congressman will be waged at the convention in this district. Lemuel W. Royce seeks re-nomination, but it is said St. Joseph county will groom a candidate to defeat him. Mr. Royce made his wife his private secretary at a salary of \$1,200, which has displeased many voters of St. Joseph and Laporte counties.

### Traveling In Kashmir.

Our conveyances were brought around, and we looked at them with some astonishment. There were two horses for my husband, and for myself and my little daughter were two of the state jumpans, such as the court ladies would travel in. They were about the size and shape of a small boat, but most dreadfully heavy and cumbersome. They were ornamented with a great deal of wood carving gilding and embroidery. A canopy covered the top, supported on poles, and between these were curtains of crimson gauze embroidered with gold stars. The inside was lined with white velvet stamped with colored flowers, and there were more cushions than I knew what to do with. Four men carried each, and four more ran beside to relieve them. It was none too many. The weight was enormous, and all the comfort might have been secured with one third of the material used. It seemed a shame to grumble, as everything was provided at the expense of the state, but I did pity those unfortunate "bearers" toward the end of our 18 mile march. Eighteen miles seemed nothing after the 60 miles we had accomplished the day before. But such an 18 miles!—Cornhill Magazine.
