NEWS OF THE WORLD

ELECTIONS FROM TELEGRAMS FOR THE WEEK.

Washington and Other News Centers furnish a Choice Collection For the Enlightenment of Our Many Readers. Knowledge Gained by Research.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 9.—Governor Mout has accepted the resignation of Thomas E. Ellison as a member of the state reformatory board at Jeffersonville. William H. Eichhorn of Bluffton succeeds Mr. Ellison on the board. The latter was a member of the last state senate and the former was a leader in the house of representatives. Both are Democrats. Mr. Ellison accepted a position on the board with the understanding that he was to be allowed to resign as soon as the institution was organized under the new law.

CATTLE BECAME INTOXICATED.

Queer Antics of Stock Fed Upon Damaged Malt.

LAWRENCEBURG, Ind., Nov. 6.—After the recent fire in the Walsh distillery here, in which a quantity of malt was damaged, Jesse McKinney, a stockman, purchased some of the malt for feeding purposes. The stock relished the feed at first, but evidently fermentation began in the malt, and soon the cattle began showing signs of helpless intoxication. Some sat upon their haunches, swaying their heads from side to side; others staggered about the field, tumbling over one another in the most ludicrous fashion; while many were simply too drunk to stand, although they made desperate efforts to regain their footing.

ANOTHER SENSATION.

Two Commissioners of Elkhart County Indicted For Accepting Bribes.

ELKHART, Ind., Nov. 9.—As a sequel to the investigation of the books of ex-County Treasurer Holdeman, it being alleged that he was short in his accounts, another sensation has been made public, which has resulted in the indictment of County Commissioners Walley and Kinnison. Holdeman appeared before the grand jury and accused the two commissioners of accepting bribes and with grand larceny. The jury returned an indictment, and the charges will be investigated. Other developments are anticipated before matters are adjudicated.

DEFENDED HIS MOTHER.

Allie Ragley Shoots Richard Curry to Death at Evansville.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Nov. 8.—Richard Curry, aged 40, was shot and killed Saturday night by Allie Ragley, aged 18. Curry had been keeping company with the boy's mother. The latter, learning that Curry had a wife from whom he was seeking a divorce, he was told to cease his attentions. Saturday night, while drunk, he attempted to force an entrance into Mrs. Ragley's home. She ordered him away, but he was persistent, and when he was about to get in the boy shot him to death. The youth surrendered.

Moved His Quartshop.

GREENWOOD, Ind., Nov. 8.—Pat Murphy, whose quartshop was dynamited here four weeks ago tonight, has moved his outfit to Indianapolis. Seven arrests were made for dynamiting the building, but the parties proved their innocence. Mr. Murphy was given hints, it is alleged, that he had better leave, and he acted accordingly. The citizens of the town are opposed to the sale of intoxicants and will not tolerate a saloon of any kind.

Revenue Deputies Appointed.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—Revenue Collector Nowlin of the east Indiana district, in which this city is situated, has appointed Frank W. Smith of Brookville his chief deputy and Lewis Hill of Aurora cashier. Mr. Smith was formerly prosecuting attorney of Fayette, Franklin and Union counties and held a clerical position in the legislature of 1895. No changes have been announced as yet in the Indianapolis branch office.

Fear Murder and Robbery.

KNOX, Ind., Nov. 8.—George H. Brown has been missing since Oct. 12 and he is believed to have been murdered and robbed in Chicago. Brown had \$200 in cash when he left for Chicago to pay some debts. Enroute he stopped at Urbana and Newman, Ills., in which places he collected \$6,600, arriving in Chicago, Oct. 21, since which time he has not been heard from.

Indiana Printing Contract.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 8.—The competition for the state printing closed Saturday afternoon by the state board awarding the contract to W. B. Burford, who has held the same for 14 years. The contract in the aggregate calls for \$80,992.14. The supreme and appellate courts' printing went to the Levy Bros. & Co., this city, for \$12,309.19.

Can't Hire Tax Ferrets.

RICHMOND, Ind., Nov. 9.—Judge Fox yesterday decided that the contract entered into by the county commissioners with tax ferrets was void. He held the law provided officers for the purpose of collecting delinquent taxes and that the county commissioners cannot farm it out to irresponsible persons who neither take oath nor give bond.

Pulp Works Burned.

MUNCIE, Ind., Nov. 8.—The Muncie Pulp company was partially destroyed by fire Sunday morning. The loss is estimated at \$2,000. The fire originated in the roof. The building is outside the corporate limits, and it was some little time before the fire department reached it. The loss is covered by insurance.

Shot Over a Game of Cards.

GREENVILLE, Ind., Nov. 9.—Thomas Dodge of this place was shot above the heart and fatally wounded by a stranger named Smith late yesterday afternoon while playing a game of cards. The shooting took place in Frank Goss' saloon. Smith made his escape.

Appointed to a Position in the Navy.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 9.—George Brown, son of Admiral Brown, has been appointed assistant paymaster in the navy by President McKinley.
