M. E. Conference at Portland Next Month

Sixty-Second Session and the Arrangement men's—Bishop Spellmeyer in Charge.

The North Indiana M. E. conference will convene at Portland April 5. Bishop Henry Spellmeyer, D. D. of Cincinnati, will preside. The conference is composed of six elder districts, which include 497 churches valued at \$2,182,969. There are 285 active preachers besides six presiding elders and 217 local preachers. The preachers draw an aggregate salary of \$160,790, annually. In the conference are 181 parsonages, valued at \$319,935. The program as announced complete for the session is as follows:
