ACCIDENT.—Last week as Roop and Wm. A. Dailey were returning home from attendance at court, they, in the vicinity of Pleasant Mills, concluded to try the speed of their horses in a scrub race. CANDIDATE FOR CONGRESS.—We would suggest the name of Dr. B. B. Snow, of this county, as a candidate for Congress in this district. The Dr. is one of the old Democratic wheel-horses, and will work in any position required of him, that has for its object the advancement of Democratic principles. If nominated he will make an efficient canvasser and will prove a formidable opponent on the stump to his competitor, whoever he may be; being a ready off hand debater, quick in repartee, following his argument to its logical sequence, and through all his efforts there is flowing a fine vein of sarcasm, that has a powerful effect upon his auditory.

Adams county has been second to none in devotion to Democratic principles, and has always given uniform large majorities. She now proposes increasing her majority, and for the first time aspires to present a candidate of her choice, when ever the Democracy of the 11th Congressional district assemble in convention to make a selection of standard bearer for the district.

The Colorado Senators.

The Colorado Senator are a couple of excellent men. They first buy the bill for the admission of Colorado through Congress by agreeing to support that body against the President. Then they attempt to buy the President's approval by agreeing to support him against Congress.

"The radical leaders are in a dreadful state of anxiety about the senator from Colorado. The latter, it seems, in order to induce the President to sign the bill for the admission of that State, have offered to support his policy, or are reported as having done so. The radical leaders now say that they will not vote for the admission of Colorado if the President vetoes the bill on that account. The United States Supreme Court decided before it adjourned that the Missouri test oath is unconstitutional, but the decision has not yet been published.

THE GOLD OF THE RICHMOND BANKS.—The Government has finally determined to hold the gold claimed by the Richmond banks as belonging to them, some account of the seizure of which I have already given. The proofs seem to establish clearly that the gold belonged to the so called Southern Confederacy, and was on deposit with the banks subject to the drafts of the Confederacy.
