From Washington.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Congress reassembled to-day, with a full attendance in both houses. No important bills were introduced, and but little legislation was accomplished.

THE SENATE occupied most of the day in discussing a resolution calling on the president for a copy of his late amnesty proclamation, and for the authority for issuing the same. It was claimed by radicals that he had no power to contemplate the attendant evils consequent upon them. It is but simple justice to the subject to enumerate a few of the many additional causes which so largely affect the health, happiness of woman in all classes of society, and which, consequently, affect more or less directly, the welfare of the entire human family. The mania that exists for precocious education and marriage, causes the years that nature designed for corporeal development to be wasted and perverted in the restraints of dress, the early confinement of school, and especially in the unhealthy excitement of the ball-room. Thus with the body half-clothed, and the mind unduly excited by pleasure, perverting in midnight revel the hours designed by nature for sleep and rest, the work of destruction is half accomplished.

A bill to pay a loyal claimant in Georgia for property destroyed by Sherman's army was debated at length without result, but with indications that such a class of claims would not be paid at present.

Senator Edmunds to-day presented the resolutions of the Vermont legislature asking that in view of the large and numerous grants of public lands to western and southern states and railroad corporations, congress shall take into consideration the claim of Vermont to an equitable and just share in the general distribution, and for the purpose of promoting its educational and internal improvement systems.

The investigation of Judge Busted's case before the judiciary committee of the house progresses.

The testimony, even thus early, is admitted by Busted's friends to be of a damaging character; and still stronger, it is said, will be forthcoming. The eminent carpet-bagger stands a fair chance for transmitting his name to posterity in an impeachment trial.

Menard, the Louisiana colored man who came in high feather with his congressional aspirations has left with a fallen crest. His impious condition was relieved by the freedmen's bureau, which furnished him with transportation free of charge to New Orleans.

The idea prevailing in the west, that there is danger of Congress raising the tax on whisky, is erroneous. It is true that money has been subscribed in New York, Cincinnati, and the other cities, for this purpose; but the movement has fallen still-born. The proposition has not been named in the ways and means committee, and not one member in that committee is in favor of it.

The schools and colleges of the south have been more numerously attended this season than ever before.
