When you have headache in the temples, forehead or just back of the ears. When they ache, smart or water, when the eyelids get inflamed often, or when you have pain in the eyeballs. When you have any nervous derangement that you cannot account for otherwise. While defects of the vision manifest themselves, as a rule, in one or the other of the symptoms above mentioned, or in combination of them, yet there are many cases where the patient may be as yet unconscious of any defect, and yet have an error. Physicians generally realize the importance of stopping these "nervous leaks" that comes through the eye and their relation to the general health, and when they suspect that this is probably one of your ailments they will advise you to see if spectacles are needed; then come straight to me. Those needing spectacles and desiring to avail themselves of the benefit of my experience and skillled knowledge of the technical part of spectacle fitting will do well to call. There is no guess work in my method. I am prepared for accuracy, measuring and examining the eye for defects


