June 17 is the date arranged for the democratic congressional convention in the twelfth district, the same to be held at Fort Wayne. No opposition to Congressman Robison is likely to come to the surface and his nomination by acclamation will occur. Amid appropriate ceremony the Indiana building at the World's Fair was dedicated Friday. The governor and staff, members of the Indiana commission together with many hoosiers were present to pay their respects to such an important occasion. The building is an architectural gem and reflects great credit upon the greatest and grandest state in the union.

Illinois has at last nominated a republican candidate for governor he being the Hon. Charles S. Deneen of Chicago. This result came after a series of conferences among the candidates, and ends one of the most remarkable deadlocks ever witnessed. It has left a foul taste in the mouth and will keep the g. o. p. managers busy to election day, smoothing out the wrinkles.

Major Menzies, one of the delegates at large to the democratic national convention at St. Louis, is stuck on the Philippine plank adopted by the Maryland democrats. In short, that platform favors granting complete and absolute independence to the Philippine Islands and establishing under American protection the first Republic in the Orient. Major Menzies is one of the many bright Indiana democrats and is safe and conservative upon all questions of public importance.

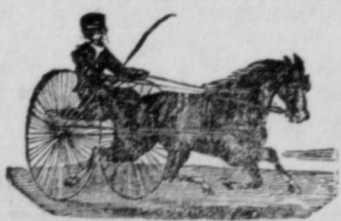

THE FIRE CROWD.

As a Rule It Likes a Big Blaze and Crashing Walls.

Whenever the bells begin to clang and the engines go rushing down the street you will see men, women and children rushing this way and that in order to see as much as may be seen of the fire and fire fighters. The hour of day or night does not make so much difference. The crowd will get there in some way and for some reason, though the great majority of the persons have no sort of interest other than idle curiosity. Once on hand, they want to see a good fire, and that's why I say they want to see the flames get the best of the firemen. They will go away and talk about what a game fight the fire laddies made.
