A dispatch from Fort Wayne

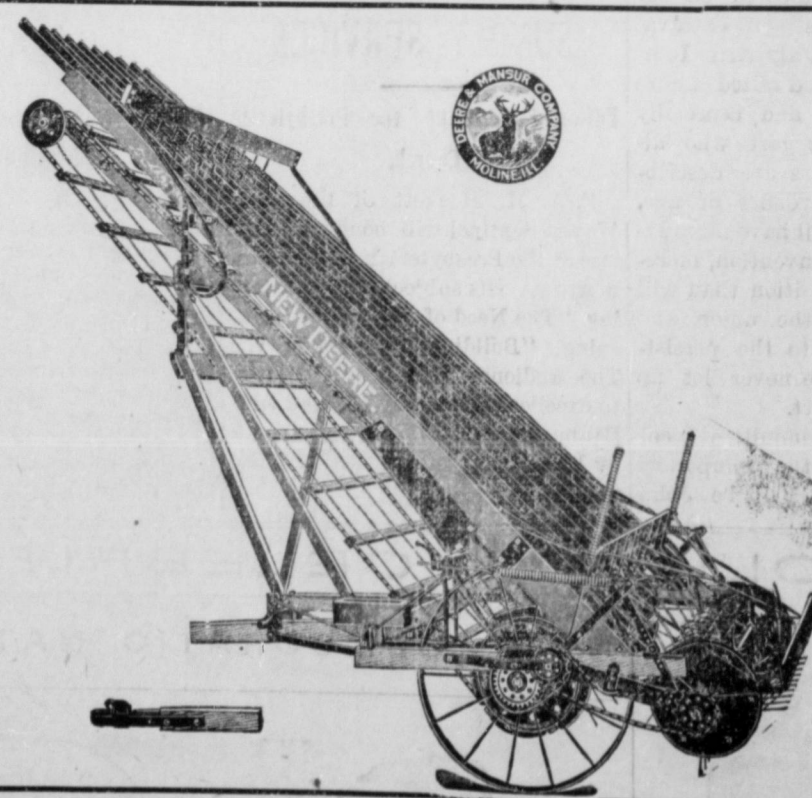
