WON BOTH

Rosenthals Take Two Hot Games

Defeated Strong Aggregation from Gas City.—Railing Pitched Good Ball

The person who came away from Steele's park last evening and said that he had not seen enough base ball in one day is certainly hard to please as the two games with the Gas City team were certainly interesting from start to finish and at several stages of the game had the fans on the verge of heart failure. The day was all that could be desired with the exception of a heavy wind which kept hard hitting down to a certain extent and the large crowd present went home at the end of the second game rejoicing that the Rosenthals had won two games and still has a clear record of ten won and none lost. The first game was called promptly at one forty five with Farrell doing slab duty, Railing playing first, owing to Touhey's injury. Coffee at short on account of Linn's father being injured and Johns in the center field. The Gas City aggregation started off with a rush securing two runs in the first inning, two in the third and one in the sixth and right here is where their part of the securing ceased. Farrell who started to pitch was wild and was taken out of the box, being replaced by Bart France who pitched a fine game considering it was his first of the season. In the fourth inning the Rosenthals got busy and scored three runs on hard hitting by Railing, Devinney, Pennington and Johns, one more was secured in the sixth one in the seventh and in the eighth the balloon went up and the rattle of base hits could be heard for several blocks, and when the smoke cleared away and the last out was made the Rosenthals had made seven runs more than enough to win the game. In this inning Pennington again loomed up with his mighty stick and set an example which his team mates were quick to follow. Charles Peterson admired the game and gave perfect satisfaction. After an intermission of fifteen minutes the second game was called with the invincible Railing doing slab duty for the Rosenthals and a young man named Dailey performing for Gas City. Owing to Railing's wildness and two bad throws the Gas City boys were able to secure one run in the first which proved to be the limit in that line for them, they scoring no more in this game. The Rosenthals were shut out until the fifth when Farrell was pushed across the plate on Pennington's two base hit, one more was secured in the sixth when Devinney scored on a two base hit by Johns—Devinney having singled and stole second from this hit. Johns who had been playing most sensational ball throughout the entire day, was presented with \$3.40 by the fans, who desired to show their appreciation of his good work. These two runs were all the Rosenthals could secure, although on several occasions the bases were filled up with only one man out. Railing's work was again a feature, he only allowing the Gas City team two hits and striking out fifteen men. Taking everything into consideration the Rosenthals played remarkable fast ball for being in the crippled condition they were, and still manages to keep their clean record of ten won. 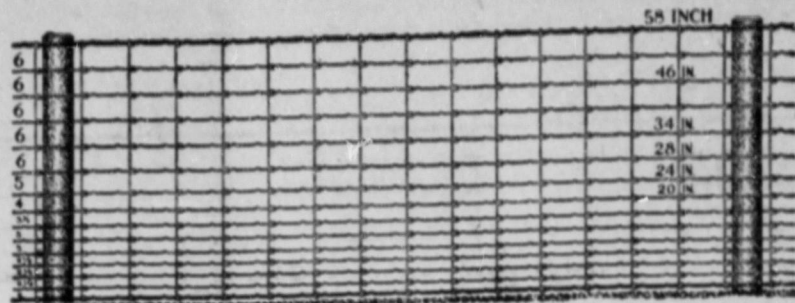
