their farms and if the Interurban subsidy is of any benefit to the business men of Decatur, they would only be partially paying a debt of gratitude they owe by voting for it.

Mr. Meyers tries to scare the people by presuming that they will be called upon to vote subsidies to a number of other roads which may be built in the future, but it is not likely that any other road will come to us in the same shape that this one has, as they have invested a fortune here which they wish to retain as an improvement to Decatur and they have become permanent residents of the city, which is a condition that no other road is likely to present, and if they do it will be time to get frightened at it when it comes.
