# Taxes.

Notice to Taxpayers!

THE DELINQUENT TAX DUPLICATE with the Second Instalment is now in my hands for collection. The amount of Delinquent Taxes is unusually large, which compels the Treasurer to commence forced collections at an early date—not later than the 1st of July 1877. Those who do not pay by that time may expect a visit from the Treasurer, or his Deputy, and collections made as the law directs. A hint to the wise is sufficient. The 2d instalment is required to be paid before the 1st Monday in November to save penalty.
