OBITUARY.

JOHN M. AUSTIN died at the residence of his son-in-law, Dr. S. L. ENSMINGER, in Crawfordsville, Ind., Saturday, July 21st, 1877, at 8:30 p. m. Born in Harrison county, Kentucky, August 12th, 1823; moved with his parents to Montgomery county, Indiana, in 1828; and in 1857 came to Rensselaer, where he resided to the date of his death. On March 28th, 1847, at Independence, Warren county, Indiana, he was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Webb, who survives him. Of five children, three are living. His sickness, a year or more in duration, was borne with patience and resignation. Funeral services were conducted at the residence of Dr. Ensminger, in Crawfordsville, on July 22d, at 4:30 p. m., by Rev. Mr. Stratton of the 2d Presbyterian Church of that city.

Mr. Austin was held in high estimation by all who knew him. His remains were met between this point and Francesville, on Monday evening, by a number of citizens, and escorted to the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. Ludd Hopkins.

On Tuesday, what remained of John M. Austin was followed to Weston Cemetery by a large concourse of citizens and sympathizing friends, and committed to mother earth, Rev. Thos. Vanscoy, of the M. E. Church, officiating. As a token of respect, many of the business houses were closed while the funeral services were in progress.

The School Trustees of Rensselaer have selected the following corps of Instructors:

SUPERINTENDENT, Prof. G. W. ALLEN, of Lebanon, Ohio.

Teachers—T. P. Wright, Candace Boroughs, Mattie Benjamin and Myra Price.

The second rule, prescribing the work of the Janitor was amended to read as follows:

2d.—The Janitor shall, before 8 o'clock, a. m. of each day, build fires, dust the school rooms, supply crayons, pointers, erasers, ink, and fuel to each room, and at 8 o'clock ring the admonitory bell, and in the evening of each school-day sweep the school rooms, halls and out-building, and see that the doors, windows and shutters are properly secured.

The 2nd rule as to duties of Teachers was amended to read:

2. Each Teacher must, at or before 8 o'clock, a. m. be at his or her school room—be strictly prompt in all school work, and attend all Teachers' meetings called by the Superintendent.

A tardy Teacher will be promptly dismissed.

The list rule as to Pupils was amended to read as follows:

1. The School is free to children over six and under twenty-one years of age, living in the Town of Rensselaer, or attached to said Town for school purposes.

All other persons desiring to attend must pay tuition in advance, at the rate of two dollars per month.

The patrons and pupils of the Rensselaer Public School can, by proper co-operation with the Trustees and Instructors, make our School equal to the best.
