Proceedings Commissioner's Court.

Convened Monday, September 3d, 1877. Present—Commissioners Geo. Kessler, John Vant-Wood, William B. Price; Auditor Henry A. Barkley, and Sheriff Geo. M. Robinson.

Ordered no warrants be drawn in payment of claims until the record settling forth such allowance be read and approved.

The issue of a warrant, in vacation, for \$944 37, in favor of J. P. Dunlap for work done on Kankakee grade, upon order of Geo. Kessler, agent, was approved.

All petitions for bridges were continued.

The action of engineer and agent of the Board, and warrant drawn for \$86 77 in favor of Wm. Ball, contractor, for work done on grade at Ball's bridge, was approved.

Petition of VanPatton et al to permit swine to run at large in Kankakee township was set for hearing Friday, (to-day).

Sundry claims allowed.

TUESDAY—Ordered, That to facilitate business all papers requiring action shall be filed in the Auditor's office before the first day of the term at which such business is to be considered.

Ordered, That all claims against the county for relief of poor and indigent persons shall be accompanied by certificate of proper trustee, setting forth that said claims are correct, etc.

Hon. W. B. Price was appointed agent of the Board to inspect bridges crossing Carpenter Creek, and if repairs are needed to contract for same.

Hons. Kessler and Vant-Wood were appointed agents of the Board to contract for planting Willows or Birch along the sides and for the protection of grade across Kankakee flats approaching to Baum's Bridge, and to paint and tighten said bridge.

Petition of Sup't Snoddy for appropriation of room and office fixtures granted and desk ordered purchased.

An appropriation of \$40 was made to Christian Miller for the immediate relief of Jno. Miller, and a quarterly allowance of \$25 for his relief, ordered to be paid out of County Treasury.

Viewers reported favorably on petition of Henry Fisher et al for ditch, and report approved.

Petition of Daniel E. Fairchild et al for ditch in Keener township dismissed.

WEDNESDAY.—The Board, on inspection of County Farm approve management of present lessee, find certain buildings inadequate, and order advertisement for bids to lease said farm for three years from expiration of present term.

Viewers reported favorably on application of Elam D. Fairchild et al for ditch in Keener township.
