### Union Rally.

A grand temperance rally has been arranged to occur at Battle Ground May 31, and will be conducted by Messrs. Hough and Ward. The order of the Temples of Honor, and the Sunday-schools of this city, auxiliary and adjoining counties have been invited to participate, and it is confidently expected that the throngs will assemble at the historic battlefield in numbers approximating 800 to 1,000.

The different roads have been requested to carry passengers at reduced rates, and the Louisville, New Albany & Chicago road will run special trains, charging but twenty-five cents for the round trip. This road will also run special from Crawfordsville.

Distinguished speakers have been invited, and will undoubtedly be present, among them are Francis Murphy, the leader of the movement, and Brick Pomery, the noted journalist and lecturer. Rev. J. W. T. Mullen, a "war-horse" on the subject, and who is widely known for his oratory and effective work, will be present, also Maco Long, of Fort Wayne. This is to close the campaign instituted by Messrs. Hughes and Ward, and it is proposed to give them a hearty "valedictory" on the cold Camp Ground. The speaking will be under the tabernacle, which has a seating capacity of 4,000. The County Sunday-school Convention will meet at Battle Ground on the same day.—Lafayette Journal

IN RENNSSELAER, May 18, 1878.

The meeting proceeded, to the transaction of business, Dr. J. H. Loughridge in the chair, Ira W. Yeoman.

On motion the following changes in the different townships, in the County Central Committee, were made, to-wit:

In the Town of Rensselaer, Thomas J. McCoy was substituted for C. P. Rensselaer, resigned.

In Jordon township, James A. Kays and Jay Lanson in lieu of Messrs. Welsh and Burr.

Keeler township, Arthur Whitson substituted for James Brooks.

In Kankakee township, G. W. Cantwell in lieu of Thomas M. Jones, resigned.

In Carpenter township, Edw'd Culp in lieu of Hon. George Major, removed to Benton county.

On motion it was determined to hold a Delegate Convention to be composed of two delegates from each township in the county, and one additional delegate for every fifty votes, or fractional vote of twenty five, polled in said county in 1876, and the same number of alternates. This basis will make the convention consist of 68 delegates and 68 alternates, as follows:
