No hope for Congressman Small.

There is no hope for Congressman
Small. He can not escape a three
years term in the state prison of South
Carolina except through the clemency
of Governor Hampton, and there is
no reason to suppose such clemency
will be extended, for the circumstan-
ces of his case will not justify it. On
the 11th day of November, 1877, he
was convicted of taking a bribe, and his
sentence was pronounced. He ap-
pealed to the supreme court, and the
appeal was now dismissed. Mr.
Small is therefore liable to be sent
to prison for a term of 18 months, or
possibly longer, if he fails to make
good his parole.
