Last Saturday evening a most gratifying and successful test of the newly invented audiophone was made at the State Institution for the Deaf and Dumb at Indianapolis. By its use the deaf were made to hear and the dumb to speak. The audiophone is a fan-shaped instrument of peculiar construction, which gathers the sounds (somewhat similar to a telephone diaphragm) and, being held in the teeth, these sounds are conveyed by their medium to the auditory nerve.
