DEAR SIR—Your favor of yesterday received. The decision of the superior court of Marion county, holding that the general exemption of widows etc., from taxation on \$500 of property under certain conditions, is unconstitutional, is so obviously right that I think the taxes should be collected without regard to the provisions of section 7 of the tax and assessment law of 1872.
