

Newspaper Decisions.
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered wishing to continue their subscriptions. 2. Subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid. 3. If subscribers do not wish to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible until they have sent them to the former direction. 4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible. 5. The courts have decided that refusing to receive a paper from the office or removing and leaving them unsealed for, is prima facie evidence of intention to fraudulently intercept a paper. 6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber. 7. If subscribers pay for papers which they are bound to receive, the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it, otherwise the publisher will be responsible. 8. Subscribers will be responsible if an express notice with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher.


