

# Newspaper Decisions.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as continuing their subscription.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are sent they are held responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered them discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible to the former direction, they are held responsible for taking them up and for removing any notices or advertisements from the office or leaving them uncollected for a prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

5. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.

6. If subscribers pay in advance they are not to give notice to the publisher at the expiration of time, if they do not wish to continue taking it, otherwise the publisher is authorized to send on and the subscribers will be responsible for an express notice, with payment of all arrears sent to the publisher.


