

Newspaper Decisions.
If subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered wishing to continue their subscription.
If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered their discontinuance.
If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible for the cost of the papers so sent.
The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."
Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held to be a subscriber.
If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of each month, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it out and the subscribers will be responsible for an express notice, with payment of all arrears, sent to the publisher.

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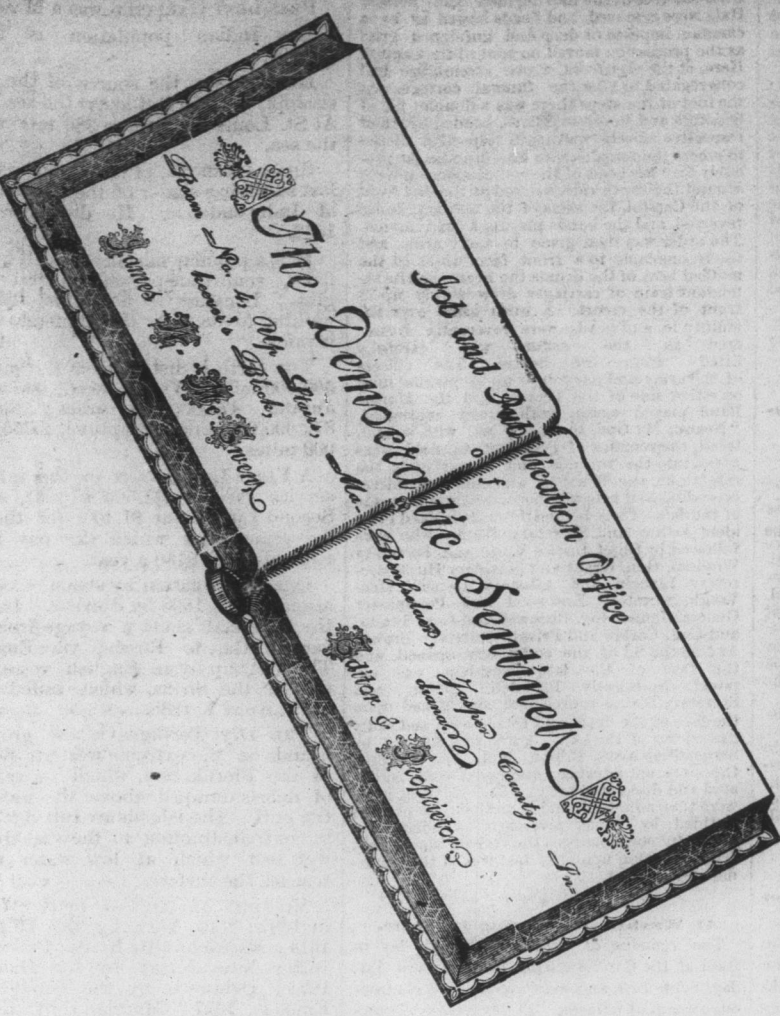
