

Newspaper Decisions.
H. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible for the same to be settled, and the publishers then discontinued.
3. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are to be responsible for the same.
4. The publishers have a right that "refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected for, is prima facie evidence of non-payment."
5. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
6. If subscribers do not advise them when to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it; or if they do not pay for it, the publisher will do so, and the subscribers will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher.
