

Newspaper Decisions.
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the publisher's office, they are directed to be held responsible until they have notified the publisher in writing of their discontinuance.
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them scattered for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscribers will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher.

Indiana State Board of Health.

The State Board also issues circular "K" as follows:

Owing to the delay in the organization of the Local Board of Health, Paragraph 1, (circular D)—special rule as to vaccination—is so modified that the health precincts where the Health Officer has not yet given notice to School Boards, Township Trustees, etc., as to the requirements of such rule, all Health Officers now or hereafter to be elected, are directed to give a proper written notice together with a copy of such rules to each School Board, Township Trustee, and faculty of college (through its proper officers) that special rule as to vaccination, Paragraph 1 will be strictly enforced on and after thirty days subsequent to time of such School Board's etc., receiving such notice. For the purpose of vaccination, non-humanized virus, or that taken directly from the cow, is the most reliable. Only in cases of emergency during the prevalence of smallpox, and where the non-humanized virus can not be obtained, and where the local Health Board is satisfied and fully indorses in writing the purity of the particular virus used in any case can the use of humanized virus, obtained from the arm of a healthy child, be allowed. As far as reason of this rule we call attention to the fact that physicians are liable to criminal prosecution if bad results ensue from the use of vaccine virus that is not pure. In such health precincts, the health officer, will make provision for the free vaccination of all who, in their opinion, need such accommodation, so that none shall suffer for want of a chance to obey the rule. Other paragraphs of the order of November 29, are unmodified and in full force.

The Board of Commissioners of Jasper County, met pursuant to law for the organization of a County Board of Health for Jasper County. Present as such Board, Hons. Isaac D. Dunn and Eliza E. Rockwood, Commissioners of Jasper County. Temporary officers were chosen as follows:

President, Isaac D. Dunn and Secretary, Charles W. Coen.

On motion George W. Burk, Commissioner, was elected permanent President of the County Board of Health and O. C. Link M. D. permanent Secretary.

The following motion prevailed: "That the Secretary of the County Board of Health be and he hereby is authorized and instructed to carry out the instruction of the Secretary of the State Board of Health of the State of Indiana."

On motion the County Board of Health adjourned to meet at the call of the Secretary.

SPECIAL RULES—VACCINATION.

1. After February 20, 1882, no person until after they have been successfully vaccinated, shall be admitted into any public or private school or institution of learning within this county, either in the capacity of teacher or pupil, and all persons admitted therein shall present to the principal thereof the certificate of some reputable physician as to the fact of their being successfully vaccinated.

2. It shall be the duty of all unvaccinated persons within this county to be successfully vaccinated within sixty days from January 1, 1882. And all unvaccinated persons coming into this State shall be required to be vaccinated within sixty days after coming into the State.

3. All children born within this county shall be successfully vaccinated within twelve months after birth. All vaccination shall be with reliable bovine virus. By order of Board.

Jasper County Board of Health.

The following special rules have been adopted and issued by the State Board of Health:

All "rules and regulations" of the State Board of Health are mandatory, and by the provision of the law "establishing a State Board of Health," etc. (Sec. 9) a fine of not less than \$5 is incurred by any person who shall refuse or neglect to comply with the requirements of such "rules and regulations" each day of such "failure or refusal," after proper notification, constituting a separate offense.

The local Board of Health throughout the State are hereby required to "promulgate and enforce" the rules herewith issued, and to enforce the penalty in case of "failure or refusal" of any person to comply with the requirements hereof.

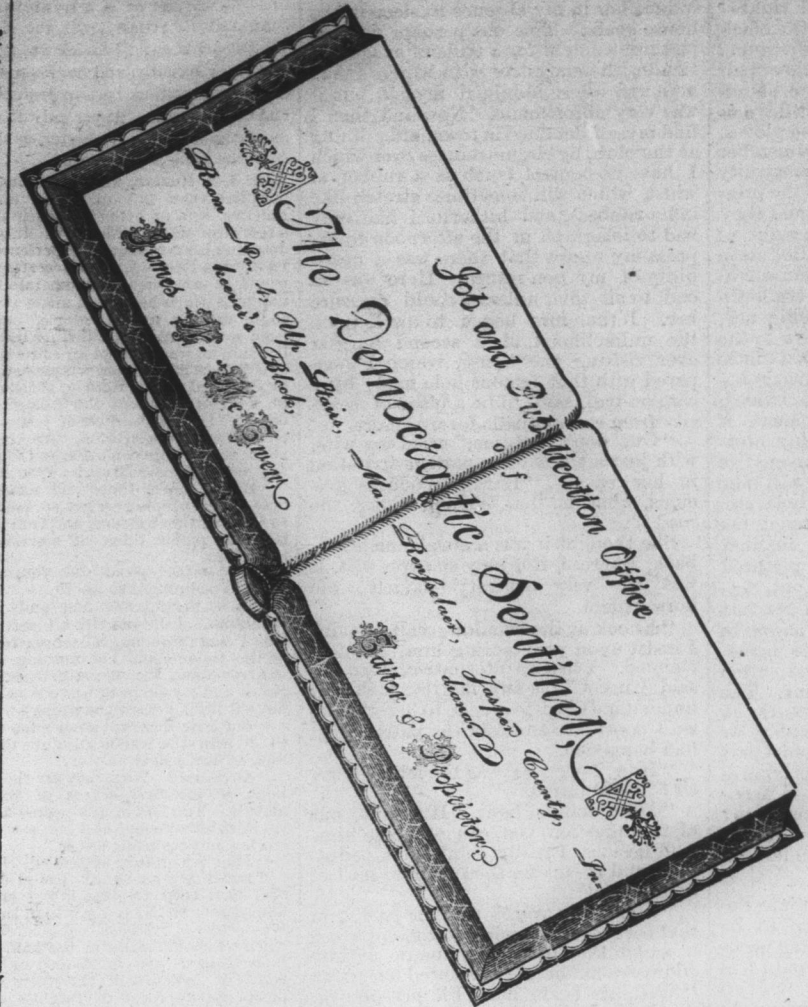
