

Newspaper Decisions.
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their paper, the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to pay their arrears, the publishers, to whom they are directed, are held responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered the paper to be stopped.
4. If subscribers, or in other places than to the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible for the same.
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take notice of a paper, and continuing to publish them sneaked for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and has not paid for it, or has ordered it to be stopped, is held in law to be a subscriber.
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to the paper until the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it, however the publisher is authorized to send it to them again, and the subscriber is bound to pay an express notice, with payment of all arrears, sent to the publisher.

State Board of Health of the State of Indiana."**

of the Secretary.**

SPECIAL RULES—VACCINATION.

**1. After February 20, 1882, no person
who has not been successfully
vaccinated, shall be admitted
into any public or private school or in-
stitution of learning within this country,
either in the capacity of teacher
or pupil, and all persons admitted
thereto shall present to the principal
thereto the certificate of some reputable
physician as to the fact of their
being successfully vaccinated.**

**2. It shall be the duty of all unvac-
cinated persons within this county to
be successfully vaccinated within
sixty days from January 1, 1882. And
all unvaccinated persons coming into this
country shall be required to be vaccinated
within sixty days after coming into this
country.**
