

Newspaper Decisions.
1. If subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscribers will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher.

RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT
At a meeting of the members of the Bar and officers of the Jasper County Court held at the court house, in Rensselaer, on Friday, Jan. 20, for the purpose of paying proper respects on the death of Eliza J. Phillips, a member of this Bar, the following proceedings were had:

R. S. Dwiggin was elected chairman and D. B. Miller secretary of the meeting.
Simon P. Thompson, from the committee on resolutions reported the following:
We, the undersigned committee of the officers and Bar of the Jasper County Court, appointed to report what action should be taken to commemorate the death of Brother Eliza J. Phillips, propose the following resolutions:

First.—It is with unfeigned sorrow that we learn of the decease of one of the junior members of the Rensselaer Bar, Eliza J. Phillips, who departed this life at 9 o'clock A. M. on Wednesday, January 18th, A. D. 1882, at the home of her parents in Rensselaer, Indiana.

Second.—The brief period during which deceased was engaged in the practice of law in our midst has manifested a clear perception of elementary principles of legal science and in forensic efforts was a brilliant and effective speaker. By experience, and effort, he would no doubt find his life and health had been spared, won an enviable merit in his chosen profession.

Third.—By the untimely death of our brother, let us all be reminded of the brevity of our careers in life, and temper our work with the fruits of charitable friendship for all.

Fourth.—As a token of respect we ask that these resolutions and the action of the bar thereon, be recorded in the Order Book of the Jasper County Court and a copy duly certified under the hand and seal of the court be transmitted to the papers of the deceased brother, and that at the same time be published in our county newspapers.

Fifth.—That out of respect for the deceased, court do adjourn at noon on Thursday January 19th 1882 and that the officers of the court and members of the bar attend the funeral in a body and that they meet at the Court House at 9 o'clock A. M. on Friday December 20th, 1882, to consider these resolutions and take such further action as be considered proper.

President, Isaac D. Dunn and Secretary, Charles W. Coen.

On motion George W. Burk, Commissioner, was elected permanent President of the County Board of Health and O. O. Link M. D., permanent Secretary.

The following motion prevailed: "That the Secretary of the County Board of Health be and he hereby is authorized and instructed to carry out the instruction of the Secretary of the State Board of Health of the State of Indiana."

On motion the County Board of Health adjourned to meet at the call of the Secretary.

SPECIAL RULES—VACCINATION.
1. After February 20, 1882, no person until after they have been successfully vaccinated, shall be admitted into any public or private school or institution of learning within this county, either in the capacity of teacher or pupil, and all persons admitted therein shall present to the principal of the school or institution a certificate of vaccination.

2. It shall be the duty of all unvaccinated persons within this county to be successfully vaccinated within sixty days from January 1, 1882. And all unvaccinated persons coming into this county shall be required to be vaccinated within sixty days after coming into the county.

3. All children born within this county shall be successfully vaccinated within twelve months after birth. All vaccination shall be with reliable bovine virus. By order of Board.

The following special rules have been adopted and issued by the State Board of Health:

All "rules and regulations" of the State Board of Health are mandatory, and by the provision of the law "establishing a State Board of Health," etc., (Sec. 9) a fine of not less than \$5 is incurred by any person who shall refuse or neglect to comply with the requirements of such "rules and regulations" each day of such "failure or refusal," after proper notification, constituting a separate offense.

The local Boards of Health through out the State are hereby required to "promulgate and enforce" the rules herewith issued, and to enforce the penalty in case of "failure or refusal" of any person to comply with the requirements hereof.

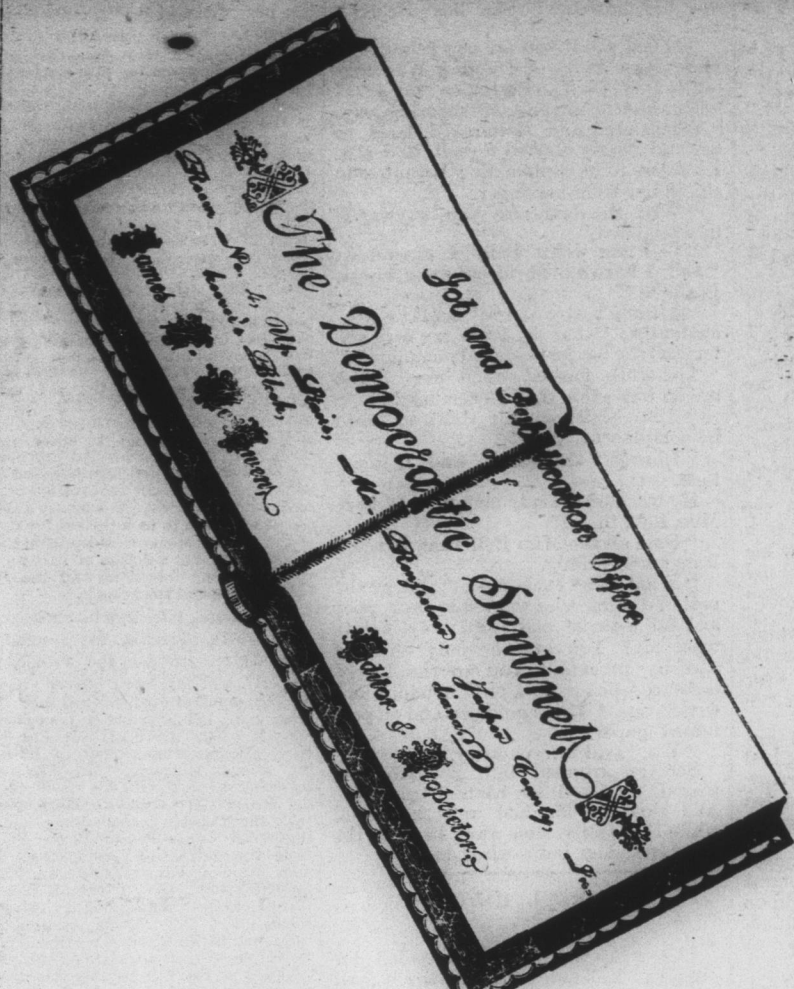
