

Newspaper Decisions.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered wishing to continue their subscription.

2. If subscribers, under the disconnection of their paper, do not receive it for a week or more, and until all arrears are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to pay their periodicals from the time of their disconnection, and then become responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered them disconnected.

4. If subscribers move to other places without giving notice, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.

5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the publisher, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."

6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes a copy of it, either he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.

7. If subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscriber, in payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.
