

Newspaper Decisions.
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the editor are considered wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their paper, the editor will let them continue to receive it until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their paper, the editor will let them continue to receive it until they have settled their bill and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers move away, and the papers are sent to the former direction, the editor is held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take a paper, and not paying for it, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."
Any person who receives a newspaper and makes out of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
6. If subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to take the paper at the time at the end of the time, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is entitled to his money.
7. If subscribers do not pay, the publisher is entitled to an express notice, with payment of all a **ten** days' **notice** to the publisher.
