Congressional Committee Meeting.

The Democratic committee of the 10th Congressional district met in the Council chamber, at Logansport, Tuesday, and the purpose of fixing the time and place of holding the Democratic Congressional Convention was the basis of representation. The meeting was called to order by A. B. Crampot of Delphi, chairman, at 2 o'clock.

On motion of Dr. Thompson, of Pulaski county, Thomas J. Tuley, of Logansport, was made Secretary, and on motion of Mr. Keefe, of New Haven, the meeting proceeded. The committee of the different counties were fixed at one vote for each hundred voters and one vote for each fraction thereof. Carried.
