

**Newspaper Decisions.**  
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered wishing to continue their subscription.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals, from the publisher, he continues to publish them until all arrears are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals, from the publisher, he continues to publish them until all arrears are paid.  
4. If subscribers move to other places, and settle their bills and ordered their periodicals sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.  
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals, from the publisher, and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and neglects to pay for it, has ordered it, and is held in law to be a subscriber.  
7. If subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to give notice to the publisher, at the end of their periodicals, if they do not wish to continue them; otherwise the publisher is authorized to sell them.  
8. An express notice, with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.
