

Newspaper Decisions
1. Subscribers who do not pay for their papers are considered delinquent and their names are placed on the list of those to be discontinued.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their papers, the publishers may continue to send them until the order is received.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their papers, the publishers are not responsible for the same.
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, the papers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take papers from the office or removing and leaving them scattered for the public to see" is an express notice, with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher.
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their term, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscriber will be responsible for it as an express notice, with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher.

Political Blackmailing.

A Washington despatch states that Don Cameron, the Pennsylvania boss, has assessed the eleven Rensselaer steel companies of Pennsylvania \$1,000 each for campaign purposes of the straight Republican party in Pennsylvania. Ten of the companies promptly assented to the draft, and the eleventh hesitated and took advice, but finally concluded, it is understood, to pay up, although there were a number of Democrats among the stockholders who kicked at this blackmailing of their interests for political purposes. The demands of the Republican machine leaders for funds are greater at this time than ever before in an off year. Assessment of 2 per cent still continues to be made upon all of the officers and employees of the Government and not satisfied with this leading manufacturing interests are being assessed for political purposes.

A large amount of the assessment money in Pennsylvania is being used to circulate Mr. Kelley's speeches and an additional order for fifty thousand copies was made a few days ago at the Government printing office, where they are printed for the cost of paper and press-work, bound in the folding-room at Government expense, and set free over Mr. Kelley's frank. There is much indignation expressed among Democratic members at the assessment of employees of the House by the Republican congressional committee. The one-legged and one-armed soldiers on the roll, whose salaries are \$1,200 a year, have been assessed \$24 each, and the old soldiers are kicking against this exaction, although some of them have but one leg with which to do the kicking. The House pages, who are generally the sons of widows, or have no father or mother, have been assessed \$10 to \$15, according to the length of their service; and the laborers in the navy yards have all received notice to pay up. This is also the case in all the other departments of the Government at 2 per cent upon the salaries of 10,000 office-holders, if all the office-holders of the Government will receive pay up, the committee will receive over \$2,000,000 from this source alone, and it is believed that the machine has sufficient power to exact payment in all cases. Whenever the latest disposition is manifested to be lenient, two or three removals will accomplish the desired end. There is a prospect of a lively discussion of the matter of political assessment. Senator Pendleton, of Ohio, has given notice of his intention to call up his resolution directing an inquiry into the recent demand for contributions made upon the employees of the Government by the National Republican Congressional Committee. Money will flow like water in Pennsylvania, but people will triumph in the end.

It is estimated that the south has this season paid to the north \$25,000,000 for wheat, \$50,000,000 for corn, \$72,000,000 for meat, and about \$25,000,000 for hay, butter, cheese, oats, apples, potatoes, etc.

A lawyer in Philadelphia remarks: "The Independent movement is something remarkable in this city. It really represents the Public Schools and education in a vast revolt against the long-lived men who have been directing the course of the city, to the detriment of this state. It begins at the top and runs to the bottom."

CHECK—A neighbor editor who probably had some reason to complain, speaks in this manner: "We like to hear a man refuse to take his home paper, and all the time sponge on his neighbor for the reading of it. We like to hear a man complain when asked to contribute for his home paper that he takes more papers than he reads now, and then go around the corner and borrow his neighbor's, or loaf around till he gathers in all the newspapers from the city, and then run down his home paper as not worth taking, and every now and then beg the editor for a favor in the editorial line. We like to see a mechanic or merchant refuse to advertise in his home paper, and then try to get a share, not only of the editor's custom, but of the trade which the newspapers bring to town. We like to see these things. It looks very economical, thrifty, progressive and classy."
