

**Newspaper Decisions.**  
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered their discontinuance.  
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.  
5. The courts have decided that "continuing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them scattered for the prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held to be a subscriber.  
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their term, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscribers will be responsible for it as an express notice, with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.
