

**Newspaper Decisions.**  
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice of their non-compliance consider it sufficient to continue their subscription.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to receive them and hold responsible until they have informed the subscribers of their discontinuance.  
3. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the new address, the publishers are responsible.  
4. The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncanceled for, or prima facie evidence of, non-compliance."  
5. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is liable for the cost.  
6. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue their subscription. The publisher will then be entitled to a full refund and the subscribers will be responsible for an express notice, with payment of all fees, to the publisher.
