

Newspaper Decisions  
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their subscription, the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their papers, the publishers are not responsible for the same.  
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, the papers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible.  
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take papers from the office or removing and leaving them scattered for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.  
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their term, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscribers will be responsible for it until an express notice, with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.
