

Newspaper Decisions.
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as continuing their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their subscription the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible until they have notified their bills and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers move to other places without notifying the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing them leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their term, if they do not wish to continue; if not, otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscribers will be responsible for an express notice, with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.
