

Newspaper Decisions.
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers desire the discontinuance of their paper, the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their paper they are held responsible until they have settled their account with the publishers, and the papers are sent to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
4. The cords have done nothing to the office or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
5. Any subscriber who receives a newspaper and uses it as if it were his own has forfeited it or, if not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
6. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to the publisher, and publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it, or otherwise the publisher may require payment in advance, and publisher will be responsible for an express notice, with payment of all arrears, sent to the publisher.
