

Newspaper Decisions.
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice of the contrary are considered to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their subscription the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their papers from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible until they have notified the publishers and the papers are sent to their homes or to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
4. The publishers have decided that "refusing to take their papers from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected, for instance, evidence of intentional fraud."
5. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.
6. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their term, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the subscribers will be responsible for it as an express notice, with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.

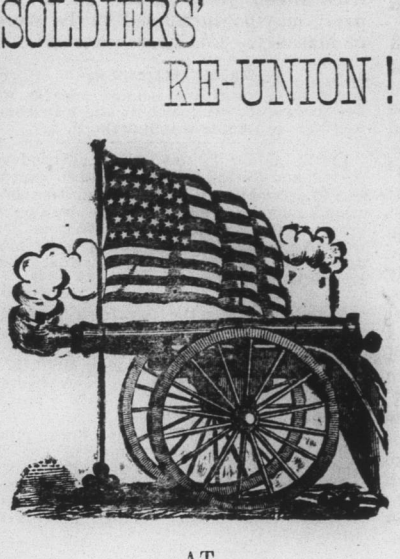

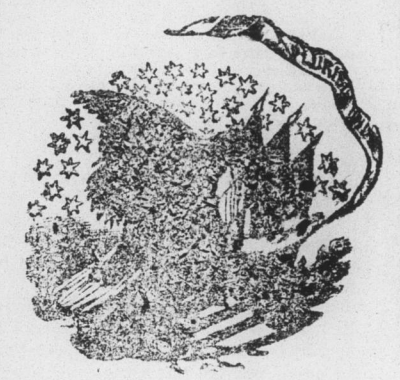
