Damphool Waiteth for Ohio.

The special to the Chicago Tribune, reads as follows: "Columbus, Oct. 11, 1 a.m.: Richard Smith of the Gazette, while measuring the Democratic victory at about 30,000 in the cities and large towns, says the losses have been in nearly every part of the state. He says the demoralization of the Republican party in New York and Pennsylvania had its effect here."

There was provided in the old Constitution no mode of submitting to the people separate amendments. The advantage of this provision is that it may be proposed at any time, and submitted to the Legislature, the new Constitution, the time of the next session of the Legislature, to be held in the fall of the year, and then to be voted on at the next session of the Legislature.

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
