

**Newspaper Decisions.**  
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered willing to continue their subscription.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are held responsible until they have notified the publishers in writing that they have discontinued their subscription.  
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible for the cost of the papers.  
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.  
7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their term, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send him on and the subscribers will be responsible until they give express notice, with payment of all arrears, to the publisher.

The fact is that writer was on the home stretch for political capital and synops by his pet selfish aims prompted him. Personal, there is no love between the author of the Republican article and Mr. Robinson. If any damaging reports have gained circulation he and others of his party are responsible. They insinuated that "true, all of our (their) candidates" were not men of life-long sobriety, etc., thereby sending broadcast through the columns of their own organ, the inference that some of their candidates at least, had a reputation for dissipation. The Republican papers have been persistent in their demands for Mr. Hoover to explain his position on submission. He had already done so before the committee which placed him in nomination, but to gratify them, he furnished them with a copy of the letter which appears in another column. They refuse to publish it, but tell their readers that "he has been smoked out!" What there is in that of either honesty or malice the people will determine. Their sole object is to deceive their readers.
