

The Indianapolis Journal of the 8th says:

The announcement was made from Democratic headquarters last night that the proposed amendments to the State constitution, agreed to by the Legislature of 1860-1861, were not properly set forth in the House journal, and are, consequently, not before the people at all, and the action of the Legislature in permitting them to have them properly placed on the records. The constitution provides that an amendment must be proposed by one Legislature and set out on the record with the ayes and nays, and submitted to the succeeding Legislature. An inspection of the House journal corroborates the statement that the vote was not properly recorded."
