

**Newspaper Decisions.**  
1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the editor are considered willing to continue their subscription.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their paper, the publishers may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their paper, from time to time, and the publisher has reason to believe they were held responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered them discontinued.  
4. If subscribers move to other places without giving notice, and the publisher has reason to believe they are moving in the former direction, they are held responsible.  
5. The courts have decided that "refusing to give periodicals in the office or removing and keeping them without a valid reason, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and does not pay in advance the cost of the same, is held to be a subscriber.  
7. Subscribers pay in advance their cost of paper, and do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on and the publisher will be responsible for the cost to the post office.
